Within many law enforcement agencies, National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) CyberTip reports are typically investigated by detectives, who are juggling many other investigative responsibilities. With the increase of NCMEC CyberTip reports being generated and forwarded to law enforcements for investigation, more officers without prior Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) training may be assisting with these investigations.

This course is an introduction course providing training of how to investigate a NCMEC CyberTip report from beginning to end. The skills learned in this course may also be applied to other ICAC related investigations.

In addition to a lecture style instruction, attendees will participate in hands-on tabletop style learning.

Instructors:

Senior Special Agent Tami Taubel began her career in law enforcement in 2006 and then accepted a position as a special agent with the Wisconsin DOJ-DCI. Upon hiring, Tami was assigned to the Internet Crimes Against Children Unit where she still remains. In addition to her primary assignment, she is the team leader of the Joint Tactical Team Crisis Negotiation Unit and a member of the Child Abduction Response Team. Tami instructs on topics related to Internet Crimes Against Children both on a local and national level.

Special Agent in Charge Joseph Mech retired from the Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) in December 2022, after almost 29 years in law enforcement. As a Special Agent in Charge, Joe supervised Special Agents assigned to the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force from 2015 to 2022. Prior to that, Joe served as a Special Agent assigned to the ICAC Task Force for 4 years. Joe has received training in undercover investigations of chat rooms and file sharing networks and has both conducted and supervised numerous investigations of online child exploitation. In 2011, Joe was the recipient of the Wisconsin Attorney General's Internet Crimes Against Children Law Enforcement Award for his work on an attempted child exploitation investigation.
